The need for engaging civic education

We live in an increasingly politically polarized nation where incivility and distrust in government is at an all-time high and young people report record high levels of cynicism about their government. Yet most students lack access to engaging civic education. Low income students and students of color are least likely to have access to high quality civic instruction to help them develop the skills, knowledge and dispositions to be informed and engaged citizens.

Mikva Challenge's Action Civics programs reverse these negative trends by providing powerful learning opportunities and authentic democratic experiences that engage students not only in civics, but in their own learning. Mikva Challenge provides educators, counselors and youth workers with the curriculum, professional development and support needed to engage young people in high quality, student-centered, project-based Action Civics instruction.

Beyond civic education, action civics

- Develops academic and social and emotional skills including critical thinking, communication, and collaboration
- · Improves school culture and community through youth leadership and youth problem solving
- Enhances teacher effectiveness through inquiry driven, project-based learning
- Creates authentic opportunities for interdisciplinary learning
- Connects classrooms to the larger community and allows students the opportunity to showcase their knowledge and skills
